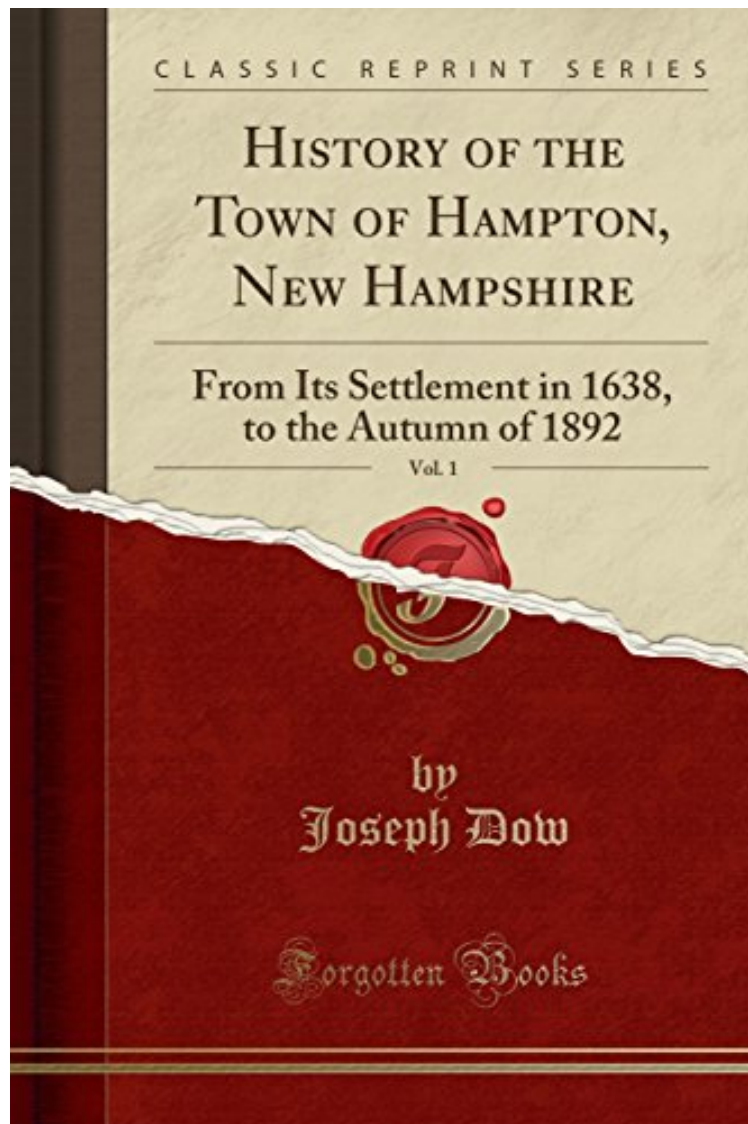

To Adjutant General Head's Reports to the New Hampshire Historical Society's Collections, the New England historic-genealogical Register and kindred works; while the records of town, church and county have been the main reliance for the history of local affairs. If I have succeeded in preparing a worthy memorial of my native town, in the years fast receding, I shall not have labored in vain.
