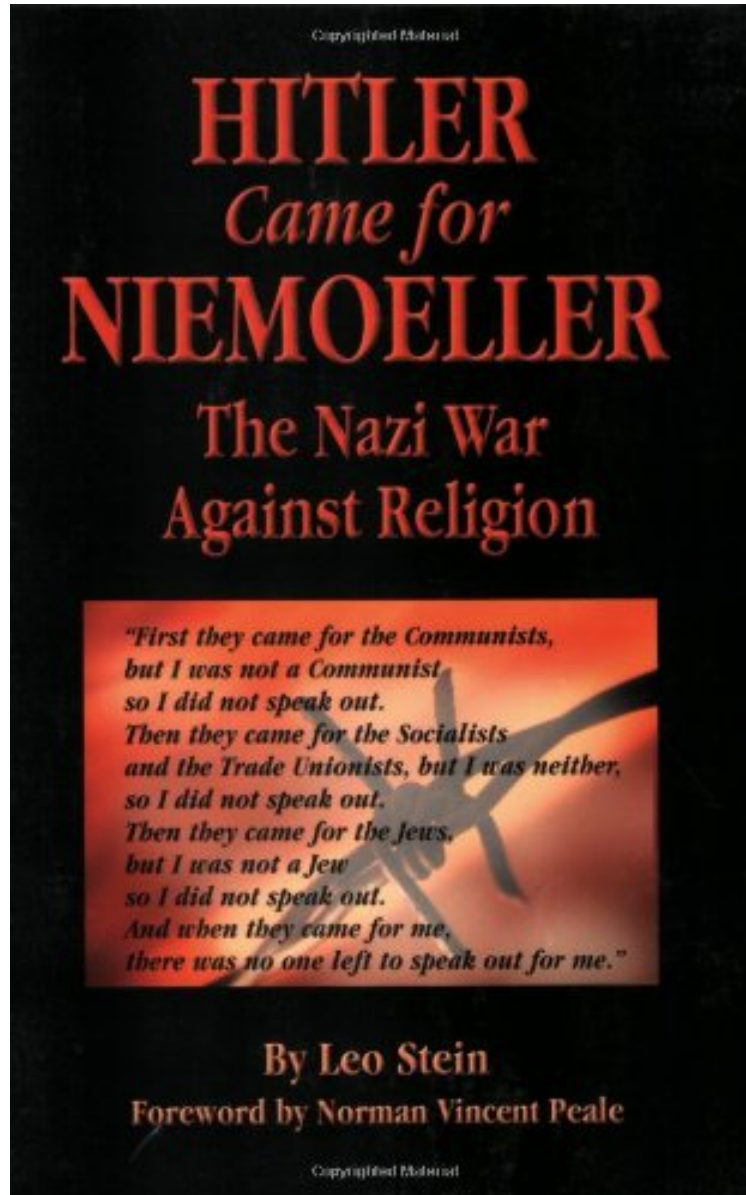

Niemoeller, a German pastor, was an early vocal opponent of Nazism.
