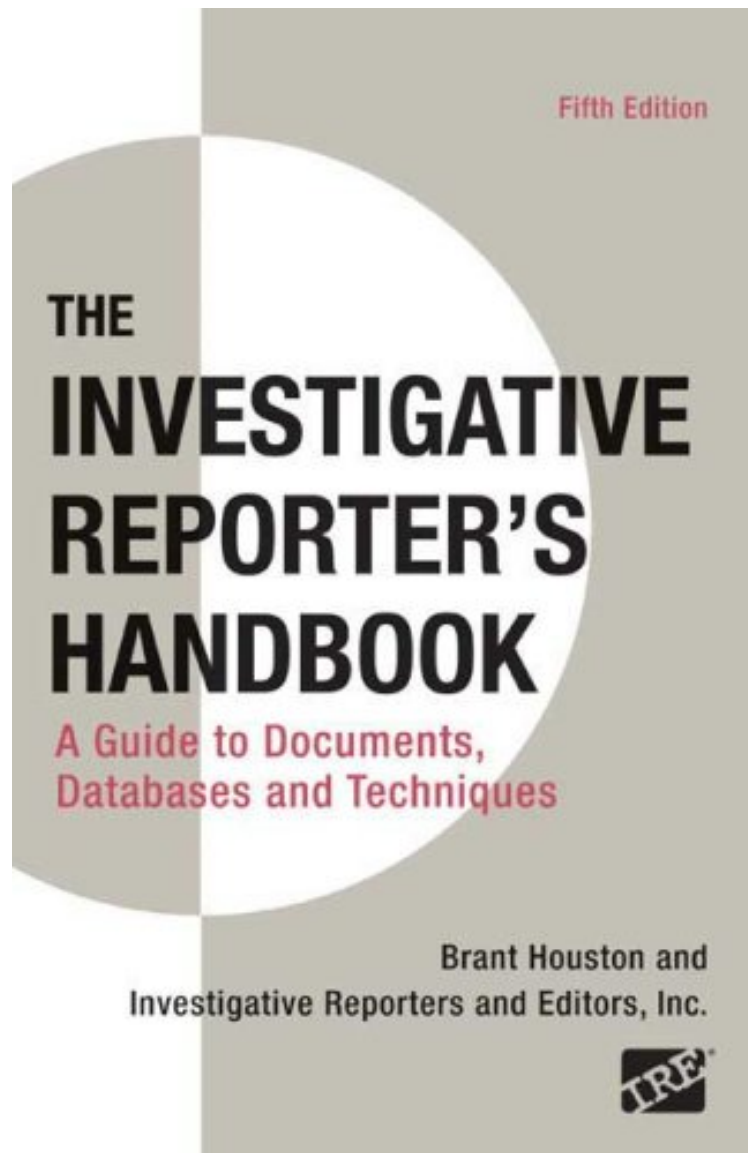

This text covers a grab bag of techniques that investigative reporters can use in putting together an investigative piece. It offers practical advice (e.g. don't get absorbed in documents, don't get absorbed with sources, but carefully manage your interviews with sources and use them to guide your documents enquiry) as well as specific advice (e.g. problem banks, insurance companies, politicians, etc). This book is written for an American market, so when it refers to sources of information, like government offices of a particular stripe, it will be a uniquely American information source.
