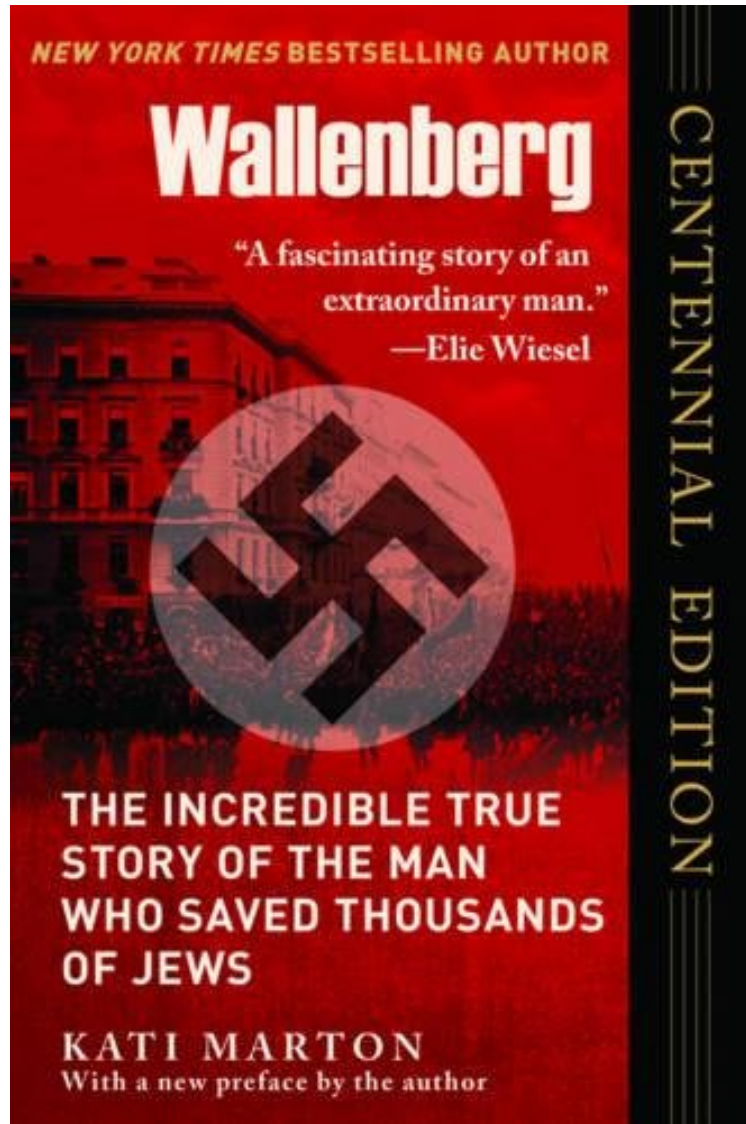

I appreciate the research that went into preparing the book. The ending was not fun and the officials of most of the countries involved do not come through looking very good. Even if the author may have overstated the case a bit, this is a story that illustrates misconceptions of that time period after the war. It is well worth the time it takes to read though you may find the end of the book a bit tedious.
